
Here are the duties of the Lodge Vice-President as per the By Laws of the Grand Lodge of California. Many Lodges have other things that the Lodge Vice-President oversees. Speak with your Lodge President and see what kind of responsibilities are expected in your Lodge.

Article 43-Local Lodge Vice-President

The Local Lodge Vice-President is the second ranking officer of the Local Lodge and shall have the following duties:

- A. Takes the place and assumes all rights and duties of the President when the President is absent:
- B. Succeeds to the Office of President whenever the President for any reason whatsoever, ceases to occupy the position and shall be legally installed in the Office of President as soon as possible.

After all the experience working your way up, I would hope any Local Lodge Vice-President would then run for the position of President at the next Local Lodge election.

# Christmas in Italy: A Month of Traditions

Beautiful Christmas in Italy is like no other celebration! When we study Christmas around the world, Italy is one of the unique countries we look at: shepherd bagpipers, elaborate Nativity scenes, and a kind witch that flies on a broom. The traditions of Christmas in Italy are based heavily on the religion of Christmas in Italy isn't only the special day of December 25: throughout December and January there are a number of religious holidays to mark the festive season.

**DECEMBER 6:** La Festa di San Nicola. This festival in honor of St. Nicholas, the patron saint of shepherds, is celebrated in towns such as Pollutri. According to tradition, St. Nicholas saved the people of the town from a famine by feeding everyone with a handful of fava beans. To commemorate the miracle, the town lights fires under enormous cauldrons, in which fave (broad beans) are cooked, then eaten ceremoniously.

**DECEMBER 8:** L'Immacolata Concezione – Immaculate Conception celebrates the birth of the Virgin Mary (Mother of Jesus), born without sin. The day is marked with celebrations and processions throughout Italy and with most people off from work, it is also the day when many Italians put up Christmas trees and other holiday decorations.

**DECEMBER 13:** La Festa di Santa Lucia. The Feast of Santa Lucia is originally from Sicily, and now celebrated in some areas of the northeast as she brings kids extra gifts before Christmastime. It is sometimes celebrated by families with large traditional feasts of homemade pasta, and special dishes.

**DECEMBER 24:** La Vigilia di Natale. On Christmas Eve during the evening, Italian families and friends have the traditional "cenone," that is the BIG Italian dinner.

The presepio (manger or crib, and the Nativity) is the center of all Christmas decorations in Italy. The Nativity scene represents in miniature the Holy Family in the stable and is the most common symbol of Christmas for families. The presepio is actually more important than the Christmas tree in Italy, as it represents the real meaning of Christmas according to the Catholic Church. Almost all Italian churches will display their presepio outside, or in the main piazza (town square); some are elaborate, others rustic, some have live animals, and some are extremely old and valuable.

At midnight, zampognari and pifferai, shepherd bagpipers and flutists who represented the original shepherds visiting Baby Jesus, come down from the Abruzzi Mountains around Rome to play music and entertain the crowds of people at religious shrines in the area. The zampognari and pifferai wear traditionally colorful costumes with vests of sheepskin, knickers, white stockings, and large cloaks. Here are some in a video:

**DECEMBER 25:** Natale Christmas is referred to as Natale (meaning birthday in Italian). According to the most authentic Italian tradition, the gifts for the children brought Christmas Eve are brought by Gesu' Bambino (Baby Jesus); Santa Claus is a recent new addition that is taking place as well, but it's not the original Italian one. For people living in Roma, the Pope gives a blessing in the square of the Vatican City, at noon on Christmas day from his balcony.



# The Christ Child

God is worshiped in diverse ways. One way he is worshipped is as a child. The beauty and innocence of a child evokes sublime love. The developmental phases of a child are an amazing process of individualization. The child represents all that man can be when he attains full enlightenment. As a child must be protected to come to maturity so to must one's worship of the Creator be cultivated. So it is understandable that devotions are practiced glorifying our Lord's childhood, human and divine. This is expressed in sacred art, literature, and music.

Sometimes Jesus Christ is represented and worshiped as the divine Infant. Christmas and the Feast of Epiphany celebrate his birth. Sometimes Jesus Christ is portrayed as a wonderful child. The Gospels don't reveal much about Jesus's early childhood. After the narration of his birth, the next mention of Jesus is the Finding in the Temple when he was twelve. (See the Gospel of Luke, Chapter 2.)

The famous statue of the Infant Jesus of Prague, given by Princess Polyxena of Lobkowicz to the Discalced Carmelites in 1628, celebrates the Lord's infancy. Another famous statue is the Santo Bambino of Aracoeli. The Santo Bambino of Aracoeli is a 15th-century wooden image enshrined in the titular Basilica of Santa Maria in Aracoeli, Rome, Italy.

The statue of Santo Bambino of Aracoeli (also called "il Bambinello") shows the Christ Child swaddled in golden fabric, wearing a crown, and adorned with gemstones and jewels donated by devotees. Pope Leo XIII authorized its public devotion in 1894 and granted a canonical coronation in 1897. It was again blessed by Pope John Paul II in 1984. The image was purportedly stolen in 1994 and replaced with a copy. Millions of tourists and locals have visited the basilica to view it.

The statue of Santo Bambino of Aracoeli was carved from a block of olive wood from the Garden of Gethsemane by a Franciscan friar assigned to the Holy Land in the 15-century. People have long associated the image with healing.

The theft of the Santo Bambino caused outrage in Rome. The police being unable to recover it, a number of rich individuals offered a ransom. The inmates at the Regina Coeli prison even wrote a petition to the unknown thieves asking for its return. And when the petition failed, they donated money for the new copy. The image was too well-known to be sold. What do you think were the motives of the thief or the thieves?

Devotion to the Christ Child stirs deep thoughts and emotions and inspires many good works.

# **ITALIAN CHRISTMAS**

First of all, we would like to clarify that we perfectly know that many people don't celebrate Christmas and that this festivity is especially associated to the Christian religion, the birth of Jesus Christ, the three Wise Men etc, but here in Italy Christmas is by now associated to many other things that have nothing to do with the religion, such as:

- 1. TO GO SHOPPING Christmas is a festivity that is characterized by conspicuous consumption: in spite of the cold and the low temperatures, many people flood in the streets – rigorously decorated with lights and decorations – to crowd the shops and hoard the most beautiful things to give to friends and family, but also to themselves! Very often we also buy stupid Christmas-related things that we won't use until the next Christmas!
- 2. Another Christmas tradition in Italy, as in many other parts of the world, is DECORATING THE CHRISTMAS TREE. According to the Italian tradition, all the decorations are put up on the 8th of December (that is the Immacolata day in Italy). But pay attention to who is going to decorate the tree... not everyone is able to achieve great results!
- 3. Under the tree, every family puts all the PRES-ENTS that, at midnight on Christmas Eve (the 24th of December) will be unwrapped!
- 4. Obviously, among the Christmas decorations in Italy, we cannot forget the typical nativity scene NA-TIVITY SCENE with the cave, Mary, Joseph, the ox, the little donkey and baby Jesus!
- 5. In any case, what really characterizes Christmas for every Italian is the ancient dilemma: PANDORO or PANETTONE? The desserts that are the protagonists of the Italian Christmas are without any doubt these two: pandoro and panettone! In every house, every year, is always the same story: fights about which one to buy and which one is the best. The main difference between the two is that panettone has candies, while pandoro is empty inside and it is dusted with powdered sugar.
- 6. A reason for many family fights are also games such as the TOMBOLA. This traditional Christmas play is like bingo, with the only difference that not only wins who makes "cinquina" [5 numbers in the same row] and "tombola" [filling out all the numbers], but also wins who makes "ambo" [2 numbers in the same row], "terno" [3 numbers in the same row] and "quaterna" [4 numbers in the same row]: obviously, the awards are proportioned.

# But when do the Christmas celebrations end in Italy?

7. Between Christmas and New Year's Eve, the celebrations continue in Italy, until the EPIPHANY, that is the 6th of January, that, from a religious point of view, is the day in which the three Wise Men visited baby Jesus, but, from a folkloric point of view, it is the day in which the "Befana" arrives. "La Befana vien di notte con le scarpe tutte rotte il cappello alla romana viva viva la Befana!" (famous Italian nursery rime about this character). The Befana is an old woman a little ugly but generous! She usually gives children some socks full of sweets!

Expression of the day DURARE DA NATALE A SANTO STEFANO: last very few, like the time between these two days, that is the 25th and the 26th of December (for example: Queste scarpe sono state fatte malissimo! Non sono durate da Natale a Santo Stefano! These shoes have been made badly! They lasted a very short time!)

In conclusion, we can say that the essence of the Italian Christmas is spending time with the people we love, trying to be more generous and taking a break from the daily routine. But now leave us a comment explaining which are the traditions in your country... we wish you BUON NATALE e FELICE ANNO NUOVO (Merry Christmas and Happy New Year)!

# Salt

Salt is a chemical compound (NaCl) composed of sodium and chlorine. We cannot survive without it. It flavors and preserves our food. It is commonly used in shakers alongside black pepper. The ocean contains great amounts of salt. But most of the salt we buy in tiny crystals is mined from the earth. Seas that evaporated millions of year ago have left behind layers of rock salt. Salt can also be obtained by drilling wells into salt deposits.

Salt has been used to make chemicals used in manufacturing, everything from rubber to steel. Factories would shut down if there were no more salt. But there is enough salt on earth to last millions of years. A thousand years ago the Venetians made a fortune in selling salt. Today, iodine is added to some brands of salt as a nutritional supplement. (Iodine deficiencies affect about two billion people around the world and is a preventable cause of mental retardation.)

Salt has played a social role as well as a nutritional one. In some societies salt was used as money. Roman soldiers were paid partly in salt. The English word "salary" comes from the Latin word for salt "sal." Salt has been used in various ceremonies around the world.

Salt is used in English expresions to imply worth and wit. The apostle Paul encouraged Christians to let their conversations be full of grace, seasoned with salt (Colossians 4:6).

Medieval alchemists experimented with salt. It has been used by witches for protective spells. There are various superstitions about salt, too. To keep bad luck away, one can throw a little salt over one's left shoulder. Most of the superstitions we have forgotten.

Many foods are tasteless without salt. A salty taste is one of the four "primary tastes" with sweet, sour, and bitter being the other three. The preservation and flavoring of food such as meat and fish with salt is called curing food. Salted foods resist spoiling.

Salt is a symbol that sometimes appears in our dreams. If you dream you are cooking with salt, it may mean good days are ahead. Putting too much salt on food may warn of overspending. Spilling salt suggests displeasure and quarrels. And dreaming of salt may mean someone will soon be recognized for his wisdom.




- Thank you for sharing your time and talents.



Dear Mr. President,

On behalf of the Conference of Presidents of Major Italian American Organizations (COPOMIAO), we would like to convey the supreme disappointment of our organizations, as well as our own personal disappointment, at the hurtful, disparaging, and insensitive proclamation that you issued on October 8, 2021. In your remarks on Friday, you became the first President to issue a proclamation for Indigenous Peoples' Day on the same day as Columbus Day, and in doing so you have reaffirmed to the entire Italian American community that you do not support us, nor do you value the contributions and sacrifices of our community to this nation's history. These sacrifices and contributions have long been recognized by former Presidents with the celebration of Columbus Day as a federal holiday, and your actions yesterday have marginalized those achievements and alienated our entire community.

By effectively "canceling" Columbus Day, you have shown that you, like so many other Americans, do not truly understand our story, which began with the lynching of eleven Italian immigrants in 1891 by a mob of over five thousand people in New Orleans. Many do not know that this was the largest mass lynching in American history, and that these atrocities toward Italians continued with over forty additional lynchings over the course of thirty years. At the time this took place, the New York Times, the most widely read newspaper of the day, applauded the lynchings, and later President Roosevelt stated that the killing of these immigrants was "a rather good thing". This hostility toward Italian immigrants created an atmosphere of aggression and antagonism directed at our community that lasted for decades. It was because of these brutal atrocities that President Harrison proclaimed a national Columbus Day the following year to honor and thank Italians and Italian Americans for their contributions to the United States. You, sir, have undone over a century of good will and effectively stated that our contributions hold no meaning for you personally, or for our great country, despite the fact our First Lady is of Italian American heritage.

The Italian American community has long been a proponent of an Indigenous Peoples' Day to mark the achievements of Native Americans to our nation. However, we believe these achievements should be acknowledged in addition to, not in lieu of, the achievements of Christopher Columbus, and that Indigenous Peoples' Day should be rightfully honored as its own distinct and separate holiday. The advocates for the removal and diminishing of Columbus Day base their argument on three false narratives that have been incorrectly and unjustly spread by those seeking to besmirch and vilify the great explorer.

The false narrative begins, most strongly, with the issue of slavery. Columbus is wrongly portrayed as the man who introduced slavery to the New World. Nothing could be further from the truth. Columbus never owned a slave, and, in fact, the slave trade had already existed and thrived long before his arrival, with the Native Americans possessing thousands of Indigenous slaves, and continued long after Columbus's death. It is not widely known that the slave trade from Africa did not begin until one hundred years after the death of Columbus, nor is it acknowledged that many Native American tribes owned African slaves. It is also seldom reported that Columbus is the man who pleaded with Queen Isabella to allow for the baptism of the native people to protect them from becoming slaves, because under the laws of the day a baptized person could not be enslaved.

Secondly, those seeking to cancel Columbus state that he was aggressive and brutal toward the native population. The truth is that Columbus was a great friend to the Taino Indians and had a good and mutually respectful relationship with their chief. Columbus and his men protected the Taino people from the ruthless and vicious attacks they had long endured by the neighboring cannibalistic Carib tribe who sought to massacre and enslave them. Columbus adopted a Taino Indian boy as his own son, and to this day, Columbus' achievements and contributions are celebrated by the descendants of the Taino people throughout Puerto Rico.

The third narrative, one which has long since been debunked, is that Columbus was responsible for genocide in the new world. This negative portrayal insinuates that Columbus and his men intended to murder and slaughter all of the native population they encountered. When examined rationally, it is clear that this is a preposterous falsehood. The main motivation of Columbus's journey was not to plunder, but to evangelize the world and bring the Christian faith to all that he encountered. Columbus also sought to develop strategic trade partnerships in these new lands, not to indiscriminately massacre the population. The truth is that it was the inadvertent spread of disease, not the sword, that unfortunately killed vast numbers of the native population. The global COVID pandemic we are facing today is a prime example of how easy it is for a virus to spread over a vast population, and how devastating its effects can be.

Speaking on behalf of over fifty of the largest and most influential Italian American membership organizations, that represent the vast majority of the nearly sixteen million Italian Americans in this country, six percent of the total U.S. population, COPOMIAO strongly condemns your proclamation and acknowledges that you obviously do not wish to establish a meaningful relationship with the Italian American community. Our organization has shown its support for you personally, as well as for the First Lady, who has twice been invited to speak at our National Italian American Summit Meetings and has declined on both occasions. Your abandonment of the Italian American community has been noted by the majority of our members, and your dismissal of Columbus and his achievements signals your blatant disregard for our contributions and our worth as an ethnic minority group.

Every ethnic group in this country has made meaningful contributions to our society and should be recognized for those accomplishments in a productive and mutually respectful way. Just as we have vocally supported the celebration of an Indigenous Peoples' Day, we demand that the achievements and accomplishments of Italian

Americans continue to be honored and celebrated as they most justly deserve to be. The history of the Italian American community is deeply woven into the very fabric of our nation, and our contributions to the advancement of the national culture is of equal value to every other ethnic group that comprises the United States of America. Columbus Day is the only clearly recognized national acknowledgement of the history and sacrifices of Italian Americans, and by taking that away from us, and promoting another ethnic group in our place, you are alienating our entire community and sowing the seeds of further division rather than being the unifying force that you have declared yourself to be.

It is regretful and disheartening that you believe neither the Italian American community nor the Indigenous Peoples' community deserve their own separate and distinct holidays. You can begin correcting this situation by issuing an apology for your recent hurtful and disrespectful remarks, as well as issuing a new proclamation designating Indigenous Peoples Day on any day other than Columbus Day. Just as we do not wish to diminish the sacrifices and achievements of Native Americans, we ask for the same respect and acknowledgement for our own sacrifices and achievements. There is no reason for you, or any American, to support the minimization and dismissal of our cultural achievements. In order to strengthen the bond amongst the many ethnic groups that comprise our country, something that is so desperately needed at this time, we should be acknowledging and celebrating all of our respective achievements. By favoring and celebrating one ethnic group at the expense of another, your proclamation is counterproductive, disappointing, and divisive.

Only you can correct and repair the damage you have inflicted upon the relationship between the Executive branch of our government and the Italian American community. We respectfully request a meeting with you to discuss our concerns and make a genuine effort to find a mutually agreeable pathway forward that honors our community and preserves our history.


