Columbus Day Fact vs. Fiction

- Fiction: Columbus didn't discover America. Fact: In every significant way, he did. Even if others visited the continent sporadically before he did, their voyages had no historical significance. Columbus's voyages, however, marked the end of the thousands years of isolation between the Western Hemisphere and the rest of the world. The recorded history of the Americas and the Caribbean starts with Columbus
- Fiction: Columbus was a slave trader. Fact: Columbus never owned any slaves or brought any to the Western Empire from Africa. On his return to Hispaniola in November 1493, he learned that all his men had been massacred by another Taino tribe. Columbus and his men fought these Indians, capturing about 2,00 and in 1495 sent 500 of these prisoners of war (POW's) to Spain to be sold as slaves as was the custom in 15th century Europe.
- Fiction: Columbus was a racist: Fact: No evidence indicates that Columbus thought the islanders he met were racially inferior in any way.


Wow, I'm so excited. I was asked to be one of the judges for the cuicidati contest that Antioch Lodge will have on November 17, 2019. I'm honored

Membership as of 3/31/2019, total 32,208, a 2-year decline of 2,904 and annual decline of 4.3%. One of the proposed By-Laws change-article 4 to form a new Grand Lodge was 500 members now 400. The Student Summit was very successful. A total of 21 students were registered. The Nela Gala will be May 22, 2020 – honoring the Paul Polo family. The amount of \$200,000.00 from the earthquake relief funds was contributed to the newly built Elementary School in Muccia Marche, Italy. A plaque will be placed on the school property honoring OSDIA/SIF. There will be No per capita tax increase until 2022.

I attended the 97th Anniversary of the Colombo-Stella Lodge #1147. It was a delicious dinner, with a raffle and silent auction. The proceeds to benefit Birth Defect Library @ Valley Children's Hospital, plus other various local charities.



"How could this have happened?" I asked myself over and over again. "How could this POSSIBLY have happened?"



In all fairness, Fra Noi wouldn't be possible without the many miracles of modern technology, but when that technology goes rogue, there can be hell to



Tattooing

Tattooing is popular today, especially among the young. Tattooing is an ancient practice of permanently decorating the skin with colored dyes. Tattoos don't wear away easily. They fade only after many years of wear. Egyptians mummies have preserved ancient tattoos.

Some people have had almost their entire bodies covered in colorful tattoos. At one time, sailors were the persons most likely to get tattooed. The usual place for the tattoo was on the arm or chest. A circus usually had a performer whose body was covered in tattoos.

Tattooing was common in many parts of the word. Africans and Pacific Islanders commonly tattooed themselves. So did the Native Americans of the Pre-Columbian Americas, native Australians, and the Japanese.

Tattooing is done by puncturing the skin and putting colors into the holes. In its original technique it was quite painful, but modern tattooing using an electric needle made doing it less painful.

The popularity of tattooing began after Captain James Cook's voyages to the South Pacific in the late 18th century. During the American Civil War both Union and Confederate soldiers sported tattoos.

Tattooing was done for various reasons. It may have originated in the belief that it protected an individual from evil spirits or brought good fortune. Because tattooing was once painful it was sometimes done to show how brave the individual was. Some warriors tattooed their faces so no one could see an expression of fear on their faces. Tattoos also could indicate to what tribe someone belonged.

Today, most major cities have tattoo parlors and tattoo artists who tattoo people. San Francisco has been called the tattoo capital of the United States. Many people like tattoos they think are beautiful or symbolic. Other people like tattoos that express identity or a feeling of affection or humor. Tattoos sometimes give people a feeling of confidence.

Tattooing carries health risks, including infection and allergic reactions. If you decide on getting a tattoo, be sure to do research and know the tattoo artist. Getting tattooed can hurt. It is necessary to take special care of newly tattooed skin by keeping it moist and staying out of strong sunlight. Getting sunburn on a new tattoo can hurt a lot. It is best to keep the tattooed skin bare. Clothing directly on a newly tattooed area can suck up soothing ointment. Don't be surprised when people admire or comment on your tattoos. Tattoos make an interesting topic of conversation.



God's blessings to all.



Garibaldi – Meucci Museum

A History of the Garibaldi – Meucci Museum House By Joy Bruno

On April 23, 1850, Antonio and Ester Meucci embarked on the big Norma from Havana, Cuba and arrived in New York City on May 1, 1850.

Soon after arrival they went to live in the cottage on Forest Street. Meucci, an inventor, established a candle making business, The New York Paraffine Company, which he ran until it burned down on October 23, 1860.

It is believed that prior to Meucci, the cottage was occupied by Max Maretzek a composer and conductor of opera who arrived in New York in September1848.

He may have met Meucci when he took control of an opera group that came to New York from Havana Cuba. With that group came tenor Lorenzo Salvi, who lived with Meucci for a while. He initially purchased the house, but in March 1855 he sold it to Meucci for \$5.

In July 1850 Garibaldi arrived in Staten Island and befriended Meucci who offered him a home in his cottage. He worked in Meucci's candle factory 1850 to 1851. Giovanni P. Morosini also resided with them for a short time

In 1862 Meucci put the cottage up as collateral for a mortgage of \$3,000 from Mr. Samanos, a friend of Meuc-

ci, who allowed them to live there rent free.

Upon Mr. Samanos death in 1876 full payment of the loan was called. Mayer and Bachman Brewery purchased the house and property. The house was moved to the opposite side of the street. For many years Ester Meucci occupied the house and was very attached to it. It is said she refused to leave the house and remained inside while it was moved across street. "If it tumbles down, I shall die with it". The house did not fall down but was successfully moved across the road.

Ester Meucci asserted their rights as lawful owners for the property after having settle the mortgage in full. July 1882 Meucci and Bachmann came to a legal settlement granting Meucci a "lease for life" and allowed to remain in the house rent free for the rest of their lives. On March 9, 1884 a marble plaque was placed over the front door, on which was inscribed:

Here lived in exile, from 1851 to 1853

Giuseppe Garibaldi The Hero of Two Worlds Dedicated by His Friends

The dedication ceremony was followed by tours of the bedroom where Garibaldi stayed and singing patriots songs and a banquet.

Following the deaths of Ester Meucci (December 21, 1884) and Antonio Meucci (October 18, 1889) on April13, 1891 the remaining possessions of the house were sold at public auction. The house remained in its location on Forest Street. For a short of time the cottage was used as spent with Meucci.

The Garibaldi Memorial was dedicated on July 4, 1907, the 100th anniversary of the birth of Giuseppe Garibaldi.

Crowds gathered at the base of the Garibaldi statue in Washington Square Park and paraded downtown. The parade marked the largest sale of tickets for the Staten Island Ferry to date

The crowd took the Staten Island Rapid Transit to St. Mary's stop, where the conductor called "All out for Garibaldi"

While the cottage was the location of much celebration, it also hosted a number of protests. On May 8, 1914 two men tried to burn down the monument by starting a fire under the stairway to the second floor.


Only two months later, on July 4, 1914, a group of 300 anarchists and I.W.W. members (Industrial Workers of the World) took over the scheduled celebration of Garibaldi, ripping down the American and Italian flags and hoisting the red flag of anarchy. The rioters were dispersed, prior to the expected arrival of Italian Society from New York.

On May 12, 1956, the cottage was officially renamed the "Garibaldi and Meucci Memorial Museum".

On August 23, 1962, The Order Sons of Italy in America transferred ownership to the Sons of Italy Foundation who owns the house today, and in September 1966, it was renamed the Garibal-di-Meucci Museum.

On May 25, 1967, the Landmarks Preservation Commission of New York City, designated the Garibal-di Memorial and the lot it sits on a landmark site.

On June 30, 1969, the Garibaldi House was recognized as a national landmark and is recorded in the Congressional Record Vol. 115, No. 108.


