Sisters and Brothers:

I hope this edition of the "Il Leone" finds you all well and safe.

As we draw closer to Columbus Day, I think it is time to revisit what Columbus means to the Italian American community. Lets start with how the celebration began.

In 1892, the 400th anniversary of Columbus landing in the New World, following a lynching on New Orleans where a mob murdered 11 Italian American Immigrants, President Benjamin Harrison declared Columbus Day as a onetime national celebration. The proclamation was part of a wider effort after the lynching to placate Italian Americans and ease diplomatic tensions with Italy.

Many Italian Americans observe Columbus Day as a celebration of their heritage, and the first celebration had already been held in New York City on October 12, 1866. The day was first enshrined as a legal holiday in the United States through the lobbying of Angelo Noce, a first generation Italian, in Denver. The first statewide holiday was proclaimed by Colorado governor Jesse F. McDonald in 1905, and it was made a statutory holiday in 1907.

In1934, as a result of lobbying by the Knights of Columbus and New York City Italian leader Generoso Pope, Congress passed a statute stating: "The President is requested to issue each year a proclamation (1) designation October 12 as Columbus Day, (2) calling on the United States Government officials to display

He was born in Belgium from Italian immigrant parents and he learned to cook from his grandma. He moved to California where he opened three restaurants, and then on to New York.



Greetings Brothers and Sisters, I hope everyone is staying safe during these unprecedented times. Has anyone attended the Feast of San Gennaro in New York City? This September is the 94th anniversary of this important Italian-American festival (Festa di San Gennaro) It is also celebrated in many US cities. Originally a one-day religious holiday, the festival was first celebrated in the USA in September 1926, when immigrants from Naples gathered along Mulberry Street in the Little Italy section of Manhattan to continue the tradition they had followed in Italy to celebrate Saint Januarius, the Patron Saint of Naples. His feast day is September 19 in the liturgical calendar of the Roman Catholic Church. The immigrant families on Mulberry Street who started the feast and a group of restaurant owners, erected a small chapel in the street to house the image of Saint Januarius. They invited all to partake of their goods, asking the devoted to pin an offering to the ribbon streamers that are hung from the statue's apron. This money was then handed out to the poor of the neighborhood. Over time, the festival expanded into an 11-day street fair organized and run by people outside the neighborhood. It is now an annual celebration of food and drink, and a major tourist attraction. Centered on Mulberry Street, which is closed to traffic for the occasion, the festival generally features sausages, zeppole, street vendors, games, parades and other such attractions. The Grand Procession is held starting at 2 p.m. on the last Saturday of the feast, immediately after a Mass at the Church of the Most Precious Blood. This is

the flag of the United States on all Government buildings on Columbus Day; and (3) inviting the people of the United States to observe Columbus Day, in schools and churches, or other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies that express the public sentiment befitting the anniversary of the discovery of America. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt responded by making such a proclamation. This proclamation did not lead to the modern federal holiday.

In 1966, Mariano A. Lucca from Buffalo, NY, founded the National Columbus Day Committee, which lobbied to make Columbus Day a federal holiday. Which successfully became so in 1968.

With all the hoopla of our Indigenous Peoples, I wonder if they care enough to see what this day means to us, the Italian Americans. I do not think they do because if they did perhaps Italian Heritage Day would have been the alternative. Why usurp our day. Do they not care about the Italian Immigrants that were lynched. I'm sure they have no idea how this came about and are so concerned with their own issues that they don't care. Our Indigenous People have gone through many troubling times but to demand that the Italian Americans give up their day is not the way to make up for it.

Thank you for all you do to keep our Order strong.

### News of Western Foundation by Roy T. Vanoni, CAO

### GOLF, ANYONE.

You may wonder why is this article being written about golf. What does golf have to do with Western Foundation. Simply put, golf is very important in our program of raising money to provide for our charities and to assist with administrative costs.

We know that the majority of the money raised by Western Foundation comes from its members and their lodges through donations. In addition, certain fundraising activities are held to help with the cost of running our organization and to help fund our various charities including scholarships.

This is where the game of golf comes into play (no pun intended). Golf tournaments have been established in two different geographical areas of the Grand Lodge of California, one in the north and one in the south. These activities have generated a significant amount of money for the benefit of Western Foundation charities and its scholarship program. Following is a discussion of the two areas where the golf tournaments have been held.

### North:

For the past 21 years the Sons and Daughters of Italy Western Foundation Golf Classic has been been held in Chico, California. It started out small but has grown in size, thanks to the effort of the local golf committee headed by Michael Colletti Smith, President of the Vincenzo Bellini Lodge. Golfers and friends have enjoyed the festivities which includes a "frozen meatball" putting contest, a banquet and a lively auction and raffle. Recology, a national waste management firm, has joined the event as a major sponsor.

The money raised is shared by the Vincenzo Bellini Lodge and Western Foundation.

As an example, during a five-year period, approximately \$58,000 was raised of which 40% was returned to Western Foundation. The money that went to the Vincenzo Bellini Lodge was used to support local and national charities.

The Annual Western Foundation Golf Classic that takes place in Chico is usually held during the month of October. However, in view of the current situation with the coronavirus, it is probable that the event will be cancelled in 2020.

### South

This past year a golf tournament to benefit Western Foundation was held in the Palm Springs area, thanks to effort of Joe La Porta, President of the Dolly Sinatra Lodge. It was reported that a large field of golfers turned out for this first-time event. A check in the amount of \$5,000 was presented to Western Foundation as a result of this fundraiser.

The members of the Dolly Sinatra Lodge and their friends are looking forward to the next golf classic to be held in Palm Springs scheduled for November 16, 2020. We have to wait and see if the event will have to be cancelled due to the coronavirus.

### Jimmy Durante

Italian Americans have lived exciting and remarkable lives. Knowledge of the lives of others is a valuable resource for our own success in life. Our seniors are familiar with the lives of the great and the celebrities. Italian-American youths can gain a better understanding of American history, culture, and politics by studying the lives of Italian Americans of the past and the changing times. Youths will be inspired by what they learn and made wiser with each personality studied. Each generation is built on the experiences of the previous one. Today, let's study the personality and times of Jimmy Durante.

Durante was born February 10, 1893 on the Lower East Side of New York City. He was the youngest of four children born to Rosa and Bartolomeo Durante, immigrants from Salerno, Italy. As a child Jimmy worked in his father's barbershop and delivered newspapers. He served as an alter boy at St. Malachy Roman Catholic Church. Jimmy was fascinated by the piano so his father bought him the instrument and provided lessons. He dropped out of school in the seventh grade to become a pianist and soon earned money playing at neighborhood parties. Then at age seventeen he started working in saloons and dance halls.

When Durante was twenty-three he organized his first band. A young singer came into the club where he was playing. Her name

was Jeanne Olson. After hearing her sing, Durante hired her for his band. He married Jeanne in 1921. His act moved up to Broadway's Club Nightingale. In 1923 he opened his own nightclub, Club Durante. Durante developed a unique comedic style and became a popular entertainer loved by the fashionable society of the time. His club flourished but was closed during prohibition.

Durante's act was full of music, wit, and banter. His group recorded albums, played on stage in Ziegler's Show Girl (1929) and Cole Porter's The New Yorkers (1930), and appeared in the movie Roadhouse Nights (1930). During the next nine years he made twenty-nine movies. He remained a talent on Broadway. His show toured Glasgow, Liverpool, and London. He starred in movies with Ethel Merman.

When Durante's wife died in 1943 Hollywood believed he was through. He made a comeback performing in nightclubs in New York. He was a big hit on radio and came to be known as "Ol' Schnozzola." He ended every performance for the rest of his life, whether radio, stage, movies, or television, with the words "Good night Mrs. Calabash, wherever you are." Durante continued to work in radio, television, and movies until he suffered a stroke in 1972. He led a remarkable life and contributed much to the development of American humor and entertainment. He died January 29, 1980, in Santa Monica, California.



# Roma Lodge #1573

If the pandemic continues until a vaccine is developed, it may be well into next year before local lodges can meet and become active again. I understand what local lodge presidents are being faced with in deciding whether to try to meet or wait until society gets back to the "new" normal. As presidents we face the risk of losing members in January when the 2021 dues are being collected.

Mike has been very supportive of OSIDIA and has worked with a number of our State Lodges.

Please be assured that the CSJ is doing everything to assist our State Lodges as we, the Italian-American community, come under attack. Our State Lodges must stay in touch with filial lodges and contact National CSJ as soon as there is an issue. When we are contacted we will provide assistance. Please remember to be courteous but firm in your correspondence with your local elected offices.

### **COLUMBUS STATUES**

As a starting point, one must understand where their Columbus statue stands in the scheme of things. I've pointed out a number of scenarios.

I have reviewed dozens of articles dealing with various statues of Columbus nationwide. They vary from local municipalities, to State to Federal, on both private and public property. They all share one thing: they're coming down at a rapid rate, with no likelihood of a good ending ... unless the complacent, silent majority wakes up and demands what it wants.

I've spoken with a number of Italian American leaders and advocates, both before and after being invited to the upcoming meeting. There is no uniform response, but I do offer the following, as promised.

### There are several ways to stop the carnage:

The main concept is CONTROL. In this regard, the analysis starts with examining the history of the statue, that is, who, what, when and where issues. The most common matter is where local Italian American organizations raised funds, selected an artisan, who created the statue, and where those organizations GAVE the statue ("donated" is the buzz word here) to the local City, Town, or other municipality.

By donating the statue, the Italian groups gave away control. The city now owns and controls the statue. No one expected that at some point after the generous donation, the subject statue would be the subject of the fringe movement. That movement looks at Columbus in a different way and the vocal minority has been getting their way as of the last few years.

So, now, when the city determines that the statue is offensive to some groups and wishes to move or take down the statue, what are the Italian American groups to do? That all depends on the CONTROL.

### **CONTROL** comes in various ways:

- OWNERSHIP: This is where the statue was never transferred or donated. That is a rare matter.
- PRIVATE OWNERSHIP: This is also rare and suggests that the statue was purchased, erected and placed on private property. This is the ultimate CONTROL.
- CO-OWNERSHIP: This is also a rare matter, and suggests that the municipality and the donating entity decide in unison.

- Contract: this is surprisingly frequent (Philadelphia and Baltimore, for example). Here the city agrees to maintain the piazza where the statue sits, as well as the statue. The authority to move, destroy or permanently take down the statue depends on the agreements, covenants, and/or other writings in the contract. At least, there is a start, which is to review and have the contract examined by an attorney to determine the rights and/or authority over the statue.
- PRESERVATION STATUS: There are a number of examples where the statue is erected and then "protected" by a Preservation authority under the codes of the municipality---sometimes called "Art Commission," or other such like labels. This swings the onus to the parties who want to remove the statue, prompts a hearing or review, and is ultimately decided by a panel/commission, or other authority under the codes. Usually, the members are selected by the Mayor. It's important to research the statue at the local library, the Clerk's office and to speak with the local historian.
- **DIALOGUE** Whether the "opponent" falls under the terms of the Indigenous People, or the local college groups, an open dialogue carries with it little to no downside. It's never good to be viewed as intransient, obstinate, or just plain stubborn. Know your limits in terms of the options discussed here. If you have little or NO CONTROL, understand that your position is at the weaker level.

Also know that we're all here dealing on a fleeting basis. Some statues are over 100 years old. Where will the subject politicians, and YOU, be in just 30 years. Consider dealing with the current situation and build on ideas for the future, when things may possibly return to some degree of

### **HOW TO GET CONTROL**

The above are examples where control is created early, but the list is not complete. One can ask for preservation authority at any time after the statue is erected, and the atmosphere is different around the country.

1. POLITICAL: Votes for the candidates who will stand up to the minority, but loud, wave of demands to remove not just Columbus, but so many others reported in the press. The political on its face is hard to understand, but it really should have been anticipated. What's very unusual is the rapid and uniform rate it has taken across the country.

Politicians, by and large, are weak-kneed and usually bow to the loudest voice in the room. The silent majority has remained silent and complacent, with many afraid to rock the political and social agendas.

Regardless, a strong political drive to restore what once way is an excellent way to achieve the goal. The problem is that it takes a great deal of time. The trend of changing history started some years ago, and the momentum is still peaking. This method must be tried and is considered a poor current choice, but an excellent and effective one long range.

Fundraising for political activism, lobbying efforts, and social media communications are key. Getting our Italian American population active has been uniformly difficult, with mixed results; nevertheless, our options here are limited, but can certainly yield big results.

- 2. SELF HELP: The best example is the local Italian American groups in Philadelphia, who have swarmed and circled a number of statutes to physically protect Columbus statues in their community. It works on a temporary basis, but is not a desirable choice given the clashes, visuals, and heavy time demands to actually pull this off. I would reject this outright in that it is a shortterm, and ugly, choice.
- 3. WRITTEN CAMPAIGNS: You know the answer: letter writing, petitions and such just don't work. Unless there is an absolute barrage of letters piled on a politician's desk, elected officials will absolutely not budge under this so-called pressure. The politician's main objective has rarely been to properly represent one's constituents; the main goal is to be re-elected (Back to POINT 1). Bottom line: unless the campaign can bowl over an official, it's a waste of time.
- 4. LAWS AND STATUES: As an offshoot of the political POINT 1, an effort to lobby the legislature for protective laws would be excellent. I note the following: KNOW YOUR PLACE. This will not happen in NY State, nor will it happen in any liberal state...in the short term. The federal laws do have protective measures, but they relate to federal edifices and statues only. This would be considered a long-term goal here; nevertheless, it can be a viable option on a local basis IN THE RIGHT PLACE.
- 5. GRASS ROOT OPTION As an offshoot of the "political" discussion, grass roots involves a great deal of organization, time and some money. The point is to put PRESSURE on the political engine and the people who make the decisions. Called the "countervailing theory of pressure politics," this concept is the most typical way to go when there is currently NO CONTROL. Gaining the support of the silent majority, the theory is that politicians will cave in to the numbers of people who call, write, and show up at hearings and debates on the topic. Once viewed as a silent group, the now vocal group will usually prevail.

### Some ideas here:

- · Buy well placed ads to express your view
- Run feasible candidates in the local government
- Show up (really simple)

- 6. <u>LEGAL PROCEEDINGS</u>: So, this is the one we should target, noting that there is no clear path for the reasons stated below:
  - **a. SORTING:** In order to properly evaluate the legal remedies, we must understand the legal underpinning of the actual erection of the statue:

### i. WAS IT DONATED

- 1. DID THE DONOR INSIST ON ANY RULES AND/OR STIPULATIONS, AS MAY HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED BY THE GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY (SEE BELOW)
- ii. WERE THERE WRITTEN STIPULATIONS THAT TRAVEL WITH THE STATUE
  - 1. DID THE BENAFACTOR INSIST, AND DID THE MUNICALITY AGREE, THAT THE STATUE WILL REMAIN AT A PARTICULAR SITE FOR A CERTAIN NUMBER OF YEARS, ETC. THIS IS FACT BASED AND UNIQUE TO EACH PIECE

### iii. IS THE STATUE ON FEDERAL, STATE, COUNTY LAND

- 1. EACH LEVEL HAS DIFFERENT RULES AND LAWS TO PROTECT (OR NOT) THE STATUES
- 2. EACH LEVEL WOULD ALSO DICTATE THE COURT VENUE, I.E. WHERE A LAWSUIT WOULD BE BROUGHT
- iv. WHAT ARE THE LOCAL AND OTHER MUNICIPAL RULES AS TO THE MAINTENACE, ERECTION AND REMOVAL OF THE STATUE
  - 1. THIS REQUIRES NOT ONLY LEGAL RESEARCH, BUT, IN ALL LIKELIHOOD, AN EXAMINATION OF THE ORIGINAL AGREEMENT, WHICH MAY (SHOULD) BE AVAILABLE IN THE RELATIVE CLERK'S OFFICE
- b. CHOICE: THERE ARE MANY OPPORTUNITES HERE, BUT WHICH ONE(S) IS/ARE THE BEST CHOICE(S)?

When there are multiple choices as we have here, it's best to select that battle that would yield the best results. Winning is not actually the optimum point, as the notoriety of a lawsuit can very well be a more critical point. In this regard, one has to determine the above points, the venue of a legal proceeding, the law involved, and the "atmosphere" of the location. My choice: FEDERAL COURT. I love federal court. The judges are more serious, usually more liberal and not under the constraint of pollical pressures (they're appointed for life). The best and worse issue is that the impact of any decision would be hard on the loser.

Start with venue. Boston, New York City and Philadelphia each have large concentrations of IAs. This is important to gain traction in the location in terms of moral and financial support, but also, of course, political impact.

Match this point with the local laws. Do we have an actual CIVIL RIGHTS CLAIM? Would a federal court be the best bet? The US Constitution is a start, but note that each state has its own State Constitution, some of which offer more protection and more liberal interpretations of the law vis a vis civil rights law.

c. <u>PROCEEDINGS:</u> Not everything is created equal. A New York lawyer stands less of a chance before an OHIO court when it comes to success. That has been true for a long time. While the same law would be applied and the same arguments made, the attorney and law firm proceeding with a legal cause is best made by a local---and, usually, a powerful---law firm (reasons unstated).

In addition to selection of a local, powerful lawyer/law firm, if a tandem of a black civil rights attorney with an Italian American attorney is at all possible, the visual can go a long way. NOTE: I clerked for a prominent black criminal defense attorney in my third year of law school, in Boston. I cut classes to attend a trial where he was representing a black drug dealer trying to make his way into the Boston market. He encouraged me to sit at the trial counsel table for two reasons: (1) to learn; and (2) for he and client to benefit from my young, white face. Don't underestimate this point. That lawyer now runs a large firm and would be a first choice to present a case concerning the Boston Columbus statue.

The packaging of a lawsuit is critical. In addition to the above points, the underlying factual matters as to the creation of Columbus Day, etc. should be presented by experts. I have in mind two gentlemen I worked with in New Orleans: one an author, who is a former NOLA Police Office and, later, a Federal prosecutor; and the other a local historian. I mention NOLA for the obvious reasons of the 1891 lynching and the present benefit of tying in this historical event with our present Civil Rights claim.

Once all of the factors are weighted and considered, it's time to pick and choose perhaps three venues to bring a law suit. In each, a local firm should be retained to first offer advice as to the likelihood of success, and then recommendations as to the local laws and overall strategy.

As an example, in New York State, in order for a court to Order a governmental body to do something that they should do (protect and/or replace a Columbus statue), the proceeding is called an ARTICLE 78 Proceeding. In effect, it's a TRO (temporary restraining order), which if initially granted, requires a hearing on the points and issues. If not immediately granted, it's dead in the water.

d. MONEY: The entire discussion is DEAD MOOT if there is no gumption to speed money to back these projects. This really should be the up-front and immediate question, for if there is no financial dedication, what's the point?

Do you see any singular IA organization spending \$100,000 for such a project? Do you see a quick organization of a few strong IA groups proceeding in this manner? Time is critical in my view.

In my opinion, I would suggest that under the right circumstances, and in the right venue, the above propositions could very well yield not only positive legal results, but also a positive atmosphere where there would be traction in the IA community. Traction usually means donations, political pressure and generous results. The tide will turn. The major question is when and if at the end of the day whether there will be one Christopher Columbus statue standing anywhere in this country. We need to get pissed off in a real organized and dignified way. If this doesn't happen, don't expect success.

Here are some examples of a temporary "fix":

- Encourage local Italian American groups to take the statutes from the municipality if the latter has no plans for the statue. Erect the statue on PRIVATE property, where the municipality has no control---other than, perhaps, issuing a permit for the placement of the statue.
- 2. Encourage local Italian American groups to take/buy the statues and keep them in storage pending a better societal atmosphere.
- 3. Press the local District Attorney, police and other criminal justice elements to arrest, prosecute and try people who commit crimes involving the destruction and removal of statues. There are laws on the books already, but we see police forces around the country told to "stand down," to prioritize arrests and not initiate arrests, as well as District Attorneys who squarely reject such prosecutions.

These positions are clearly contrary to standard law enforcement and, of course, represent a new view on not only statues of Columbus, but General Grant, George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, and even those great men and women who fought for the abolition of slaves. If you want to approach this in a common sensical way, don't try.

### SUMMARY

It would be nice to press all of the alternatives listed above. That would require enormous resources in personnel and finances, but it would also require somewhat of a promise that there is a good degree or likelihood of success. If we don't try, we will never know.

Let's evaluate our options, be true to ourselves in terms of what's practical, and decide on some realistic short- and long-term goals. I'm in.

# WEAR A MASK AND REMEMBER SOCIAL DISTANTING



### Advice from the WHO

The World Health Organization (WHO) website has instructive videos showing how to wear a mask. They advise cleaning hands both before putting the mask on and after taking it off, not touching the mask, making sure it fits properly without gaps, and removing it by the ear loops while leaning forward and avoiding any contact with the front of the mask. They cover proper storage and cleaning of re-usable masks, and they remind viewers that the mask alone will not guarantee protection, and people must still follow social distancing and handwashing recommendations. They explain that prolonged use of masks does not cause CO2 intoxication or oxygen deficiency. This has been tested; despite the fears of some in the public, blood oxygen and CO2 levels are not affected by wearing masks. Masks should not be worn while exercising, because sweating can make the mask wet, which can interfere with breathing and promote the growth of microorganisms.
