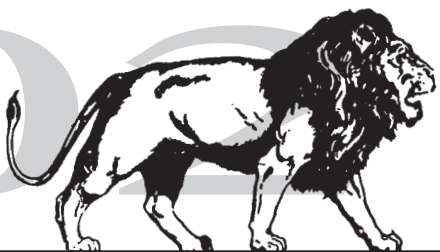

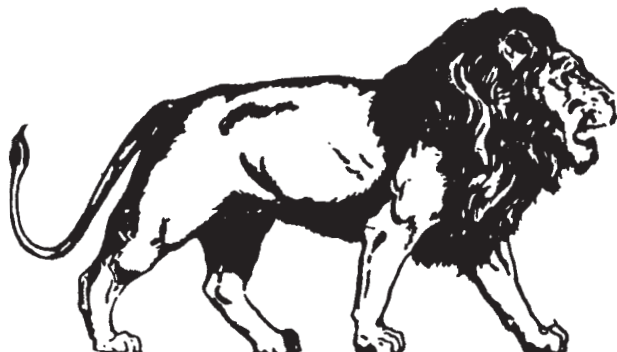

The official name of Italy is the Italian Republic (Repubblica Italiana).

Italy is said to have more masterpieces per square mile than any other country in the world.

Almost four-fifths of Italy is either mountainous or hilly.

In 2007, a dog named Rocco discovered a truffle in Tuscany that weighed 3.3 pounds. It sold at auction for \$333,000 (USD), a world record for a truffle.

Italian Food Fact

Italians take their food very seriously.

Italians claim to have taught the rest of Europe how to cook. Italy is responsible for introducing the world to ice cream (via the Chinese), coffee, and fruit pies. In addition to Belgium and France, Italy also claims to have made the first French fries. The first Italian cookbook was written in 1474 by Bartolomeo Sicci.

The Italian wolf is Italy's unofficial national animal and plays a large role in the legend of the founding of Rome.

When McDonald's opened in 1986 in Rome, food purists outside the restaurant gave away free spaghetti to remind people of their culinary heritage.

Parmesan cheese originated in the area around Parma, Italy. Italians also created many other cheeses, including gorgonzola, mozzarella, provolone, and ricotta. No one knows when the pizza was invented, but the people of Naples made it popular.[8]

The University of Rome is one of the world's oldest universities and was founded by the Catholic Church in A.D. 1303. Often called La Sapienza ("knowledge"), the University of Rome is also Europe's largest university with 150,000 students.

There are two independent states within Italy: the Republic of San Marino (25 square miles) and the Vatican City (just 108.7 acres).

Italy's San Marino is the world's oldest republic (A.D. 301), has fewer than 30,000 citizens, and holds the world's oldest continuous constitution. Its citizens are called the Sammarinese.

Vatican City is the only nation in the world that can lock its own gates at night. It has its own phone company, radio, T.V. stations, money, and stamps. It even has its own army, the historic Swiss Guard.

Most of Italy's natural flora and fauna has disappeared due to centuries of cultivation. Most of its natural wildlife has also disappeared due to over-hunting.

WEAR A MASK AND REMEMBER
SOCIAL DISTANTING



Advice from the WHO

The World Health Organization (WHO) website has instructive videos showing how to wear a mask. They advise cleaning hands both before putting the mask on and after taking it off, not touching the mask, making sure it fits properly without gaps, and removing it by the ear loops while leaning forward and avoiding any contact with the front of the mask. They cover proper storage and cleaning of re-usable masks, and they remind viewers that the mask alone will not guarantee protection, and people must still follow social distancing and handwashing recommendations. They explain that prolonged use of masks does not cause CO2 intoxication or oxygen deficiency. This has been tested; despite the fears of some in the public, blood oxygen and CO2 levels are not affected by wearing masks. Masks should not be worn while exercising, because sweating can make the mask wet, which can interfere with breathing and promote the growth of microorganisms.

TIES TO THE HOME LAND
S. Stino Di Livenza 1961
This time of isolation has caused me to think about the times I visited Italy...The first time was in 1961...everything was as it was when my grandmother lived there...over 60 years ago ,many of her relatives were still alive, her sister, brother, sister-in-law, and many cousins. We visited them all!
The gas stations didn't have

rest rooms...when asked to use the restroom you were pointed to the back of the station...yep!
The pension we stayed in when traveling in our rented Fiat...had chamber pots under the beds.
When visiting my Nonna's brother, Dominic and his wife Genoeffa and his family...the kitchen table and a hutch his son made in high school was the only furniture in the great room.
The water in the kitchen area was drawn with a hand pump.
The outhouse was in the backyard...with two flat boards for your feet at each side of a hole in the ground. A surprise for me at age 17.
The bed had two parts...a straw mattress under the feather mattress, and a feather comforter. We were certainly warm enough.
My nonna's sister-in-law, Genoeffa, would bring in coddled eggs for our breakfast...my nonna had been away 50 years...she and I , both, had a little trouble eating the eggs...
The plucked chicken meant for dinner would hang over the kitchen sink to drain.
Our dinners had the whole

chicken including head and feet in the soup pot. While we were eating my relatives would toss the bones on the tile floor for the cat.
The bedroom I shared with my nonna had only an outside entrance...so wanting a short cut I would exit the low window nearest the kitchen door...one of the times I twisted my knee. That resulted in them taking me to a local person that 'fixed' people. She popped my leg...and they wrapped it in an ace wrap.
She also chuckled at my shaved legs...at that time, ladies didn't shave their legs...actually neither did my dads sister.
Thus when we visited the leaning tower in Pisa I was not able to climb the stairs to the bell tower...but I have a photo of my nonna standing by the bell.
When we visited one of my dads cousins that appeared to live in what we would call a "pickers cabin"...she went next door and borrowed a tray and glasses...and served us homemade wine. She had red hair. Later when we went to Venice my dad picked her up to come along with us. Even though Ven-

ice was probably less than 40 miles from her home, most folks didn't travel. Most of those we visited at that time had only bicycles or Vespa's. Only one of my dad's cousins had a Fiat, her husband worked in Saudi Arabia.
My mother outfitted me with wash and wear clothes for our trip. One incident was a shrunken Koret outfit that Genoeffa washed at the artesian well next to a well worn wood table where she scrubbed the clothes. ...It appeared to be the place where others washed their clothes as well.
While there we watched them harvest the sheaves of wheat and toss them in the threshing machine, The woman working in their dresses and hats or scarves on their heads.
Twice a day Dominic would bring the cow or ox out of the barn to the water trough. We watched them spray the grapes with oxen pulling the cart with the tank of spray.
When we left my relatives I was grieved. I fell in love with the people, and way of life and the many relatives we visited.
My next visit would be 40 years later.

Italy

Italy: geography and landscape

Italy is a boot-shaped peninsula that juts out of southern Europe into the Adriatic Sea, Tyrrhenian Sea, Mediterranean Sea and other waters. Its location has played an important role throughout its history.

The sea surrounds Italy, and mountains crisscross the interior, dividing the land into regions. The Alps cut across the top of the country and are streaked with long, thin glacial lakes. From the western end of the Alps, the Apennines mountains stretch south down the entire peninsula.

For 22 centuries, Italians and their ancestors have hunted wild animals, cleared fields and grazed livestock. As a result, forests that once covered large areas of the country are gone. But the country's remote places still have wilderness largely untouched by humans. The lower slopes of Italy's Alps remain covered with thick forests, and above these woodlands are meadows where specially adapted wildflowers bloom.

Amongst the amazing mammals found in Italy are the Eurasian lynx, Italian wolf, Roe deer and Etruscan shrew – the smallest land mammal in the world! Sadly, however, human activity and habitat loss has put much of Italy's awesome animals under threat. To help protect them, National Parks have been set up, such as Abruzzo National Park – the only place in the world where the critically endangered Marsican brown bear can be found.

Throughout Italy, millions of beautiful birds stop to rest during their annual migration to Africa.

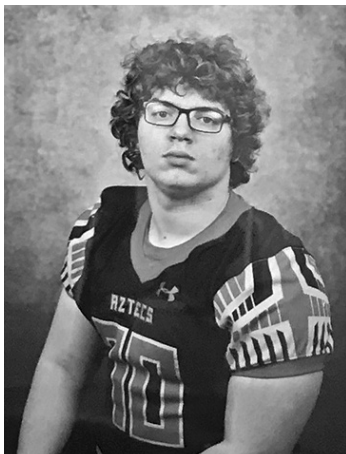

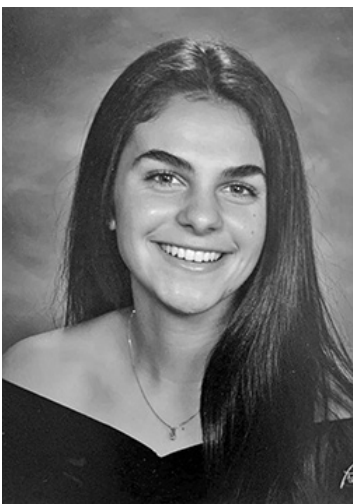

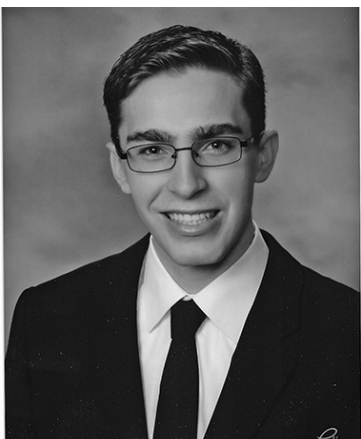

Lightning

Since prehistoric times lightning has fascinated man. People have had many strange beliefs about it. It was often regarded with a religious awe. Jupiter, the supreme god of the Romans, was thought to hold lightning and hurl it across the sky and upon the earth. He used lightning bolts as a weapon. Lightning was the ultimate symbol of his power and authority.

Lightning is a gigantic spark of electricity accompanied by an emission of bright light. Tiny drops of water in a cloud become electrically charged as they move through the air. When the charge becomes large enough, the spark shoots from the cloud. Some clouds are charged positively, others negatively. The electrical current jumps from one cloud to the other. The charge heats the air, and the air rushes out as an explosion. We hear the sound waves as thunder.

Lightning excites our senses, and it arouses our emotions. Thunder sounds like grumbling and growling, and it frightens young children. Some adults are very afraid of lightning and thunder too. Lightning can be a danger.

Lightning travels very fast at about 186,000 miles a second. Sound travels much more slowly. It takes thunder about 5 seconds to travel a mile. If you count 5 seconds

after you see lightning, you'll hear thunder if the lightning is a mile away.

Some people think that jewelry, watches, metal objects, and cell phones can attract lightning. But nothing attracts lightning. Lightning bolts hit tall buildings and structures and set them on fire. Lightning sometimes kills people and animals. It also causes wild land fires. If lightning strikes a home, it often finds its way in the plumbing. So lighting can strike a person when in the shower at home. It is best to avoid water during a lightning storm because water conducts electricity. At the beach, lifeguards tell bathers to get out of the water during thunderstorms.

The lightning bolt can be a mile long. It can be 100,000,000 volts. There are millions of volts of electricity in the several flashes in the sky. To protect homes and buildings against lightning a metal rod is placed at the top of the building that conducts electricity into the ground without damage to the building. The term "volt" used in the measurement of electricity is derived from the name of Alessandro Volta (1745-1827), an Italian physicist, chemist, and pioneer of electricity. He is credited as the inventor of the electric battery.

The Italian word for lightning is "il fulmine."

Roma Lodge's 85 Year Member!

Joe Signorelli Sr. joined the Order of Sons of Italy in America on April 25, 1936. Yes, 1936! Joe just celebrated his 85th year as a member of the Order and was recognized at the Roma Lodge gathering on May 3rd. Just three days later, on May 6th Joe passed away, with his family by his side, at the age of 96 in Lompoc, California. Joe's parents, Adam Peter and Giovanna Signorelli came to America from northern Italy in the early 1900's and farmed and ranched in the Lompoc area.

The Signorelli Family were longtime members of the "G. Marconi" Lompoc Lodge #1575 established on August 31, 1930. When the Lompoc lodge closed, members transferred their membership to the Santa Barbara Lodge #1552 which was established in 1929. In 2009 the Santa Barbara Lodge closed, and members transferred their membership to the Roma Lodge #1573.

Joe was born in Lompoc on October 26, 1934 and lived in the community for the next 96 years. Joe spent his childhood growing up and farming alongside his brothers, Peter Jr., and Frank. He often liked to recall stories of his childhood growing up in Honda Canyon and about the Lompoc he knew in his youth. Whether it was sharing the watermelon haul from his garden with his family and reminiscing about how they used to store them in the hay in the barn to prolong their shelf life when he was young or standing at the kitchen sink and making a joke about how running water is an invention because "they didn't have this when I was a kid!".

Joe's wife Sylvia was a 67-year member of the Order and passed away in May of 2019. Italian history

Italy’s location on the Mediterranean linked it with the trade routes of the ancient civilisations that developed in the region. With the city of Rome’s rise to power, the Italian peninsula became the centre of a huge empire that lasted for centuries.

Love Italian history? Then check out our 10 facts about the Ancient Romans, here!

Italy’s first societies emerged around 1200 BC. Around 800 BC, Greeks settled in the south and a civilisation called the Etruscans arose in central Italy.

By the sixth century BC, the Etruscans had created a group of states called Etruria. Meanwhile, Latin and Sabine people south of Etruria merged to form a strong city-state called Rome.

Etruscan kings ruled Rome for nearly a hundred years. But the Romans kicked out the Etruscans in 510 BC and went on to conquer the whole peninsula. They then set out to build a vast empire which, at its greatest extent in AD 117, stretched from Portugal to Syria to Britain to North Africa. Pretty huge, eh?

The first sole emperor of Rome, Octavian, took power in 27 BC and took the name Augustus Caesar. The empire flourished for more than 400 years, but by the fourth century AD it was in decline. In 395, the empire was split in two, and in 476, Germanic tribes from the north toppled the last emperor.

In the 12th century, Italian city-states began to rise again and grow rich on trade. But Italy remained a patchwork of territories, some of which were controlled by foreign powers. Beginning in 1859, an uprising forced the foreigners out, and in 1861 the Kingdom of Italy was proclaimed.

In 1914, Italy took the side of the United Kingdom and the United States in World War I, but was left in poverty at war’s end. Benito Mussolini and his Fascist Party rose to power soon after, promising to restore Italy to its former glory. He ruled as a dictator and entered World War II on the side of Germany and Japan. In the final days of the war in 1945, Mussolini was captured and executed.

Italian people and culture

Throughout history, Italian art, architecture and culture have had an influence around the world. Famed Italian painters include Leonardo da Vinci and Michelangelo. Italy is also at the heart of the Catholic Church, which is governed from the Vatican City, a city-state surrounded by Rome.
